Want Perfect Kids? Treat 'em Like They're Not

No Such Thing as a Bad Kid

All children are perfect. They are the creation of Hashem, Himself, custom tailored to you, their parents. All children are good. They want to do what is right, and they naturally want to please the adults in their lives, unless something goes wrong and disrupts that dynamic.

Because we are so invested in our children, and because we know them to be good, we have a hard time accepting or believing that they are capable of doing anything wrong. Often, our instinct is to deny, ignore or defend when we are told that our children have done wrong. But, by closing our ears to hearing our children's shortcomings, we close the door to helping them navigate those shortcomings and overcoming them

We are all amazed at Yitzchok's blind spot for Eisav, never seeing past the superficial acts of piety that barely cover the surface of his flawed character and deeds. And yet, Yitzchok falls for Eisav completely. He cannot bring himself to see the warning signs and recognize Eisav's behavior for what it is. He cannot even bring himself to trust Rivkah who sees through Eisav's deceptions. Because he does not see the signs, Yitzchok does not attempt to reform Eisav's behavior, but leaves him as is.

What we fail to see, is the Yitzchok in ourselves. Parents, believing in their child's inherent goodness and perfection are often oblivious to the warning signs that something is going wrong with their child. Even when told by teachers, principals, camp counselor's *rabbanim* and friends that something is amiss with their child, parents' knee-jerk reaction is often to deny or explain away any warning signs. Our own pride, our ego, and our overriding desire to believe that everything is OK blind us to the problems that sometimes start to surface.

Sadly, too often, when parents deny or ignore the early warning signs, they are too late to intervene in any meaningful manner to help the child, or the late intervention must be on a major scale to be effective. If we would be open to listen, we could possibly prevent serious problems down the road.

The gemara in Niddah tells us that although one is not allowed to believe lashon hara, he should be mindful of the potential dangers implied by that gossip. We should apply the same principal to our children. We should believe that our children are perfect, but we should be concerned that they might not be. We should recognize that even the best of children succumb to temptation and we should safeguard them from the harms that the world throws at them. We should recognize that our children may need our help to overcome their trials, and we should make sure they are comfortable coming to us for that help. Parents who control their children through fear do not diminish the odds of their children getting into trouble. They simply diminish the odds that their children will confide in them and turn to them for help when trouble comes knocking.

So, believe in the greatness of your children, and help them realize that greatness by acting as though you don't believe. Be supportive, loving and caring, but be ever mindful that even your amazing child can fall. If you are concerned or are made aware that your child might be having some trouble, don't stop believing that your child is perfect. But, be diligent. Do all that you can to find out what is going on. Listen openly to the other adults and even to the other children in your child's life. Open the lines of communication with your child and keep them open, and get your child the help he needs while the problem is small, rather than waiting for it to grow too large for you to help. You won't regret it.
