

We live in a disposable world. We use disposable cups, paper goods, flatware, paper towels, diapers, and countless other disposable items. Even the stuff in our lives that isn't disposable is largely disposable. Our affluence, combined with the global economy, has made it more financially sensible to replace most items when they break instead of fixing them. The old repair shops that were once part of the retail landscape are mostly a thing of the past as replacement with cheap imports has supplanted repair.

The disposable world that we live in has consequences for the environment as more and more landfill space is taken up by our disposable waste. It has consequences too in terms of the impact of the production of all these disposables on our environment. It also has consequences in the litter it produces and its effect on wildlife. Right now, between Hawaii and California, circulates a collection of disposed plastic debris, the Great Pacific Garbage Patch, that is twice the size of the state of Texas! But, what we are only first waking up to is the effect our disposable world has on our relationships.

Despite carrying out all the *makkos* and leading the *b'nei Yisroel* from slavery to redemption, Moshe *Rabbeinu* famously yields to Aharon to carry out the first two *makkos*. Rash"i explains that Moshe, having been saved by the Nile river, was not going to bring harm unto the river. Rivers, as we know, don't see and don't feel. But, Hashem understood, and made Moshe understand, that the way we treat objects has a direct impact on the way we treat people. If Moshe conditions himself to bite the inanimate hand that feeds him, he will come to bite the person who feeds him as well. But, if he is careful to show gratitude to the inanimate, he

will show gratitude to the living as well.

It is a profound idea, and has profound consequences for the society in which we raise our children. When we treat our stuff as expendable, we treat our relationships as expendable as well. We are conditioned to simply throw them out and start anew, rather than cherishing and repairing what we have. We don't want our children to grow up viewing people and relationships as disposable, and that means we need to change their relationship with the stuff in their lives.

That is not to say that we cannot use disposable paper goods for convenience (leaving environmental considerations aside for now). But, we need to be very cognizant of a throwaway attitude that we may allow or even foster within our children. Do we constantly replace things for them when they are no longer as good as new? Are we always upgrading them to the latest and greatest version of everything and casting aside the older version? Are we ourselves constantly cycling through stuff, a never-ending carousel of out with the old, in with the new? How will that impact the way our children view the relationships in their lives? What could we do instead to build in our children the patience, resilience, and fortitude to weather the storms in their relationships, to fix them rather than dispose of them?

The way we deal with objects will become the way we deal with people. Let's train our children on their objects in the way that we want them to deal with people.
