PARENTING in PARSHA

The Sages raised a dilemma before Rav Ulla: How far must one go to fulfill the mitzva of honoring one's father and mother? Rav Ulla said to them: Go and see what one gentile did in Ashkelon, and his name was Dama ben Netina. Once the Sages sought to purchase merchandise from him for six hundred thousand gold dinars' profit, but the key for the container in which the merchandise was kept was placed under his father's head, and he was sleeping at the time. And Dama ben Netina would not disturb his father by waking him, although he could have made a substantial profit.

Parents are the ultimate role models for children. Every word, movement and action has an effect. No other person or outside force has a greater influence on a child than the parent.

There is perhaps no *mitzvah* that is more misunderstood and misapplied than the *mitzvah* of *kibbud av va'em*. Often, parents understand this *mitzvah* to be their tool through which they can control the behavior and response of their underage children. The mindset, often left unstated, is that the *mitzvah* of *kibud av va'em* is the mandate, granted by the Torah, for the parent to control the child. When the child does not follow the program, parents often respond in frustration or even anger at the child for not following the *halachic* rules. That mindset is, of course, incorrect.

Like all *mitzvos* in the *Torah*, *kibbud av va'em* does not become a requirement until a child becomes *bar* or *bas mitzvah*. That is when the *mitzvah* first applies to the child and remains in place during the course of the child's lifetime. Until then, like with all *mitzvos*, parents have a *mitzvah* of *chinuch* to train the child to be able to perform the *mitzvah* properly when he or she becomes an adult. That being the case, clearly the *chinuch* that we are to give our kids in *kibud av va'em* is not how to behave as little children in their parents' home, but how to honor their parents as adults when they leave their parents' home.

It is a very important reframing of the *mitzvah* for us. When we use the *mitzvah* of *kibbud av va'em* as a club with which to hold children in line, we set children up for a frustrating and unhealthy relationship with *mitzvos*. Additionally, when we invoke *mitzvos* in a way that seems self-serving, and may even truly be self-serving it undermines our children's' faith in our relationship with *mitzvos*. If we favor *mitzvos* that get us the results we want, we breed a very cynical view of *mitzvos* indeed.

This does not mean that we don't want to train our children to be respectful. Just the opposite. Rather than demanding and expecting respect simply because the *Torah* requires it, this understanding demands of us to teach our children what respect is and how to engage themselves in it.

How do you teach children respect? Start by modeling it. Children imitate our behavior. If we speak to them and to others with respect, they will follow in kind. If we don't, they will follow that too. Show proper respect to your own parents and make sure that there is ample opportunity for your children to witness that respect. When you do your *mitzvos* in front of others, it is called showing off. When you do them in front of your children, it is called *chinuch*.

Show respect and deference to authority figures in the world around you. Teach your children the concept of authority and the proper respect we need to show to authority figures. Model it.

Remain calm. When a child acts disrespectfully, calmly try to understand the cause of the disrespect. "Why did you say that? Is it because you were angry?" Teach the child the proper way to react and talk when upset. This is your opportunity to teach respect.

Earn your child's respect. Respect is commanded, not demanded. Be kind, be compassionate, be firm, be an adult, and your child will respect you for it. Don't be afraid to admit mistakes and apologize for them. Your child will respect you for that as well.

As with all *chinuch*, bear in mind that your goal is the long-term. It is not about the respect or lack thereof today. It is about ensuring that your child will employ the proper respect when he or she reaches the age of majority. In the meantime, keep calm and teach respect by example. They will follow your lead.


Please remember to label all personal belongings - the labels may not be able to prevent the items from getting lost:), but may help them be returned to you if they are found.


