affluenza $\underline{noun \setminus a-()fl\ddot{u}-en-z} \setminus the unhealthy and unwelcome psychological and social effects of affluence regarded$ especially as a widespread societal problem: such as:

- a: feelings of guilt, lack of motivation, and social isolation experienced by wealthy people
- b: extreme materialism and consumerism associated with the pursuit of wealth and success and resulting in a life of chronic dissatisfaction, debt, overwork, stress, and impaired relationships

American society has recently coined a new term, affluenza, which appears in the dictionary, as you can see above. In fact, there was a rather famous and outrageous case in Texas where a teenage boy from an extremely wealthy family killed four people in a drunken driving incident. In that case, the teenager's lawyer argued that the boy could not be held responsible for his actions because he suffered from affluenza, whereby his dysfunctional relationship with his wealthy parents made him incapable of developing a sense of responsibility. And, while the public was rightly outraged at the brazenness of the lawyer's defense, that defense brought to light the very real problem of affluenza that has gripped American youth.

We are blessed to live in the freest, most comfortable, and most affluent society in the history of the world. Even the relatively poor in American society live better than kings would have lived a mere couple of centuries ago. We have all the modern comforts and conveniences and we don't need to leave our homes to enjoy them. We have all of the information gathered by all of humanity throughout all of history available at our fingertips. And, we are the most depressed and mentally unhealthy society in the history of the world as well. It is not a coincidence.

The ready availability of all that we want leaves us bereft of the drive and pursuit of our elusive yearnings and dreams. Rabbi Yisroel Gottlieb

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We believe that we will be happy when we have what we want. We don't realize that we will be happy when we want what we have.

The Ramba"m, in the Moreh Hanevuchim tells us that the antidote for affluenza is the observance of the yomim tovim and the values they convey. When we are wealthy, comfortable, and successful, it is vital that we take the time to consider and relive the experience of where we came from. We sit in the Succah, we eat Matza and Marror, and we realize just how fortunate we are to enjoy the luxuries we have. Affluenza is the result of never stepping out of our affluence and comfort. Taking the time to step away from it is the cure.

How does this impact us as parents? Our children are raised in various levels of affluence, but a common denominator is that our children are generally growing up far more comfortable and well off than we did. Many of them are free of the myriad household responsibilities and chores that we may have been tasked with in our youth. Many have the luxury of household cleaning help to pick up after them, regular travel and access to a wealth of toys and games at will. They are often not asked to do basic household chores and work. How can we expect them to take responsibility if we never give them any? They are at serious risk for affluenza.

We need to inoculate them from the risk by

following the Torah's prescription. We need to give them responsibility, we need to find opportunities for them to rough it. We need to pull them out of their comfort for regular intervals so that they can appreciate and value what they have. If they do, then they, and we, will have what we want because we will want what we have.
