PARENTING in PARSHA

Perhaps most appalling about Korach's unjust attack on Moshe is his accusation that Moshe has taken the leadership position in order to exercise dominion over the Jewish People. This is the Moshe who intervened to save the people from annihilation and asked for his own name to be erased from the Torah if he would not prevail. This is the same Moshe who suffered through indignity after indignity and struggle after struggle to keep the people afloat. This is the same Moshe who all but turned in his resignation at the end of the Parsha two weeks ago, only to be rebuffed by G-d who would not accept that resignation. What would possess Korach to accuse Moshe of abusing his office to exercise power over the people?

The answer lies in the psychological concept of projecting. The theory of psychological projection dates all the way back to the father of modern psychology, Sigmund Freud. Freud observed how many of his patients would take feelings and emotions that they were having and ascribe them to others. In Freud's perspective, projection is a way for a person to process his or her own emotions. The classic example of projecting would be one who has an urge to steal and now thinks that everyone around has that same urge.

Korach was hungry for power. That power would give him authority over all those around him, and he projected that same perception of power on to Moshe Rabbeinu. Korach's own view of power blinded him to the way that Moshe exercised his power as a true servant of the people. Real leaders use their power as a tool to serve the people, and not to have the people serve them. Moshe's life was spent in the service of the people, and he selflessly gave everything he had for their benefit. Korach's own perception of power, projected on to Moshe Rabbeinu, clouded his vision, obscuring the true nature of a leader of the people.

What is true of a leader of men and of nations is also true of a leader of children and of a home. Parents often say "this is not a democracy" in response to various requests or even demands by their children. It's true, it is not a democracy. It is far worse.

Parenthood means being a servant to one's constituents, and it means exercising one's power only for their benefit and gain. Parenthood, like political leadership, is a gift from G-d, and it is Hashem entrusting you to faithfully use the authority of your office in the service of those whom he has placed under your charge and care. Parenthood must follow the Moshe model of leadership, and not the Korach model.

Unfortunately, all too often parents miss the mark on this one with tragic consequences. Many times parents, frustrated at their lack of mobility in the workplace and society in general, take their frustration out on their home and their children. They view their home as their little fiefdom, and their children as the vassals of their state. Those parents will run their home as a dictatorship, barking orders on a whim, demanding what they will from their children, and expecting strict obedience and subservience. They will not get it, and if they do, it will come at the cost of their children's dignity and ability to function as normal human beings. Dictatorships make for very unhealthy homes.

That does not mean that homes should be democracies with policies voted on by the children. What it means, rather, is that parents need to take charge and make decisions not based on their own need for power, control and authority, but based on what is in the best short and long-term interest of their children. Parents will, perforce, dictate laws and rules, but not because "I say so," but because "I have a duty to say so for your benefit."

How can you tell what kind of parent you are and what kind of home you are running? A simple litmus test: On those occasions where you must pull rank and exercise your authority over your children, do you enjoy it, or do you do so reluctantly because it is something you must do? If You enjoy it, time to rethink your approach to parenting. You want to be a Moshe parent, not a Korach one.

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


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
