

Lows and Highs

ַנְּבֹּא מֹשֶׁה וַיְדַבּר אֶת כּל דְּבֵרֵי הַשִירה הַזֹּאת באָזְנֵי הָעם הוּא וְהוֹשֵׁע בּוְנוּן: Moses came, together with Hosea son of Nun, and recited all the words of this poem in the hearing of the people.

ויכתוב משה את דברי השירה הזאת על ספר עד תומם. דאמרו רבותינו ז"ל)<u>פסחים פז</u> (<u>י</u>לא גלו ישראל לבין האומות אלא כדי שיתוספו עליהם גרים. דישראל מעלים הנצוצות הקדושות שבתוך האומות ועל ידי זה נוטלים מאתם כל הנצוצות. ולהכי נקרא דברי משה שאמר בפרשת האזינו שירה שרומז על שמחה, הגם שנאמר בו שישראל יהיו בגלות, אף על פי כן הגלות גופא הוא שמחה שיעלו ישראל נצוצות הקדושה מאתם ואז בכלות מאתם הקדושה ממילא יכלו. וזהו ויכתוב משה את דברי השירה הזאת, שנקרא שירה שמורה על השמחה הגם שנאמר בו גלות. לזה אמר עד תומם, פירוש שהגלות גורם להאומות כליה, כי ישראל מעלה מתוכם נצוצות הקדושה:

Our sages in *Pessachim>* 87 state that the only reason that the Jewish people were exiled and scattered among the various nations is in order for their presence to attract worthy people amongst the gentiles to have a chance to convert to Judaism. Only the Israelites are able to help these "sparks" of holy spirits among the gentiles which have "fallen" from their celestial home to rehabilitate themselves through becoming attached to the Jewish nation. This is also why the words Moses addresses to his nation on this occasion have been entitled "vrn" "song," expressing one's feelings of joy poetically. This is so in spite of the fact that the Israelites at the time are in exile on foreign soil and may be presumed not to feel joyous at all. The positive aspects to exile, which are exclusive to exile, actually are a joyful experience, as, once the "lost souls," i.e. "sparks" of spirituality scattered among the gentile people have been repatriated, there is nothing to hinder G'd from annihilating the remainder of these people.

Perhaps the most terrifying predictions of the horrors that will befall the Jewish people in the course of their history are found not in Parashas Bechukosai or in Ki Savo, but right here in Ha'azinu. In the Parsha, Moshe calls upon heaven and earth to bear witness to the historical mission of the Jewish people, the reward for fulfilling that mission, and the terrible consequences that await when they fall short of their mandate. It is a beautiful Parsha, yet a frightening one. Interestingly enough, it is called a song. Rav Levi Yitzchak MiBerditchev notes that the word "*shira*", song connotes happiness, and he questions the propriety of referring to such a terrible series of predictions as a Shira.

The Kedushas Levi explains that, in fact, the highs and lows of Parshas Haazinu directly reflect the nature of songs. Songs rise and fall in high parts and low parts. In fact, without a lowpart a song cannot have a high part. Just as in song there are ups and downs, good and bad, so too Jewish history will be filled with its ups and downs, and the poetic foretelling of that

history is referred to as song.

But still, the term song itself is inappropriate for the low parts, for the negative. Again, the Kedushas Levi explains that the low parts, the bad times and events only look bad in the moment. In the long run, they too are part of what leads to the ultimate good and are therefore really happy moments. What in the short run seems tragic and horrid looks very different in the long run. Haazinu is a *shira* because it is a long-run view of Jewish history.

The Kedushas Levi's idea helps frame our perspective on parenting. Parenting is the world's greatest emotional roller coaster, filled with the highest of highs and the lowest of lows. Parenthood is the world's greatest *shira* because it covers the full range of emotion. But, it can also give you whiplash.

The key to successful and happy parenting is to recognize the two ideas of the Kedushas Levi in your parenthood experience. First, parents need to take a long-run view of parenthood. Rabbi Yisroel Gottlieb

PARENTING in PARSHA



Too often parents get caught up in the moment and live and die by every single victory or setback their child experiences. Parents will also sometimes panic because they get caught in the moment their child declares how much he hates them. The wise parent recognizes that he is experiencing the steep climbs and sharp falls of life's parenting roller coaster. He also realizes that over the long run these highs and lows tend to balance out. Patience is the operative word.

The wise parent also recognizes that the setbacks of youth are what lead to the successes of adulthood. The lows are simply the path to get to the highs. It is hard to see that in the moment when you are traveling to the emergency room with your child or you have been summoned to a meeting with the principal about your child. In those moments, it is critical that you take a deep breath and remember that raising children is a *shira*, it's a song, and the low part you are at now is simply the build up to the high part that will come later. Do that and you'll enjoy the thrill of the ride.

Yom Tov Planning, Covid, and Keeping School Open

Dear Parents,

As we approach the *yom tov* of Sukkos, *z'man simchaseinu*, and the extended school break, we implore you to bear in mind the potential consequences for your children and for the Yeshiva as you plan travel, trips, and social gatherings over the *yom tov*.

B"H, we have been very fortunate to this point to avoid a shutdown and even to avoid having to send home an isolated class or group of students due to potential exposure. That good fortune is the result of our strict policies, our vigilance in enforcing those policies, and the phenomenal cooperation and support of our parent body. We have had multiple talmidim across all grades who have stayed at home and logged in through Zoom in keeping with our Covid protocols, ensuring that our Yeshiva as a whole remains safe and secure.

Our goal is to continue in-person instruction, without interruption, for the remainder of our calendar year. Reaching that goal will require continued vigilance and cooperation by our entire Yeshiva family. The current uptick in Covid-positive cases in our community and in other frum communities combined with the advent of the yomim tovim presents a particular risk for all Yeshivos, including ours. The increased travel between communities for yom tov, chol hamoed trips, and the extended, close contact that simchas Torah is poised to engender, provide this virus that is still smoldering in our communities the opportunity to explode once again.

Setting aside potential public health concerns attached to a strong reemergence of this virus, a widespread outbreak will almost certainly cause us to have to switch to remote learning for multiple classes, and potentially for even the whole school.

The good news is that you have the power to help preserve our ability to maintain in-person instruction. As you plan your *yom tov* and *yom tov* travel, please bear in mind the following:


- Avoid travel to areas with a high incidence of Covid cases
- Avoid crowded places, especially any crowded indoor spaces
- Be wise in inviting company and accepting invitations from others. A visit in the *Sukkah* at a safe distance is low-risk. An indoor visit is higher risk
- Proper mask wearing and frequent handwashing will help prevent infection
- If you travel to any region on the New York State quarantine list, you will have to quarantine. No student will be allowed to come to school until his quarantine period has been completed
- Health experts are warning that simchas Torah has the potential to be a super-spreader event in the *frum* community. Be wise and safe with your family over *simchas Torah*. Try to attend a *shul* that is following safety protocols
- Do not send any child to Yeshiva after the break if he is feeling unwell.
- If your child has had an exposure to someone who tested positive for the virus, he may not return to school until he has quarantined for 14 days from the time of his last exposure to the positive case.

We intend to do everything in our power to resume and continue in-person learning after the *Sukkos* break. Your diligence and cooperation will determine if we can meet that goal. Please help us help our kids stay in school by following the suggestions above.
