### Sympathy in Sin

לְנָשָׂאוֹ על פּתֵפוֹ, מְשַׁלּם חֲמשָׁה, שֶׂה שְׁנּוֹשְׁהֹא על פּתֵפוֹ, מְשַׁלּם אַרְבּעה הוֹאִיל וְנִרְבּזָּה בוֹ ,בבא קמא ע"ט Rabban Jochanan ben Zaccai said, "The Omnipresent has much consideration for the honor of His creatures: when an ox — an animal that can walk by itself — has been stolen and sold or slaughtered, in which case the thief had not to degrade himself by carrying it on his shoulder, he has to pay fivefold restitution. In the case of a lamb, however, which he had to carry on his shoulder, he has to pay only the fourfold, because he was forced to degrade himself by carrying it".

Kids act out when they feel threatened, sad, angry, or overwhelmed

You're a farmer. You work your land and raise your sheep and cattle. You wake up one morning to find the barn door open, the pen breached. There has been a theft. You are missing a sheep and an ox is gone as well. You call the local police, who promise to do what they can. They call back. Bad news. Although the thief has been found, the sheep and ox are not coming back. The thief acted quickly, slaughtering both and selling the meat before being discovered. What is your remedy?

Fortunately, the Torah recognizes the severity of the crime and the impact on you. The thief will be forced to repay not just the value of the stolen animals, and not even the standard double-payment for theft. For the ox, he will pay five times the value, principle plus four. For the sheep, he will also pay, but not quite as much. The compensation for the sheep, four times the original value, principle plus three. Why the difference? The thief, it seems, had a harder time in stealing the sheep, needing to carry that sheep out, embarrassing the thief who stole it, while the ox walked out on its own, sparing the thief the shame of carrying the animal.

What? The guy who stole from you, the one who violated the sanctity of your space and property, he gets sympathy because the theft was hard for him! Where is the justice in that? Why is that right?

There is a profoundly important lesson here for life, one that is especially important for parents of misbehaving young children. Empathy is vital to human relationships, and is essential in helping to rehabilitate and restore those who have strayed from the proper path. The Torah perspective on compensation for theft and other harms is not limited to making the victim whole. It is also about making the perpetrator whole, restoring this individual to productive membership in society at large. That requires of us to attempt to place ourselves in the shoes of the perpetrator, to understand what may have driven him to theft, and to let him know that as frustrated and angered as we are by his actions, we have not forgotten that he too is a human being in need of empathy and support.

When we take active steps to validate the emotional state

and the needs of the criminal element in our society, we take the first step to inviting them back into society. The thief who may have felt his whole life that he is unheard, uncared for and unimportant is now shown that we recognize and value his dignity even in the course of the commission of a crime.

The same needs to be true of our relationship with and reaction to our children. Kids will misbehave at times, and some kids will misbehave many times. Old fashioned parenting notions dictated that showing kindness to a misbehaving child is wrong as it only encourages the child to repeat the offending behavior. That notion is not only false, it is counterproductive.

A child usually acts out if he or she feels threatened, sad, angry, or overwhelmed. The bad behavior isn't the illness the child is suffering from; it is a symptom of an underlying malady that is driving the misbehavior. Failure to show empathy to the child and to validate his or her feelings only compounds the child's feeling of anger, sadness, or fear helping and perpetuates the bad behavior by the child.

Parents can and should differentiate between a child's behavior and his feelings and emotions, offering zero tolerance for bad behavior while providing real empathy, support, and validation for the child's emotional state. "It is never OK to punch and kick your sister. That kind of behavior will not be tolerated." "But, that kind of behavior is surprising and unexpected. Something seems to be troubling you. What is going on?" You might even go so far as informing your child that you know how embarrassed he might be for engaging in behavior that is inappropriate and beneath is dignity, and let him know how bad you feel for him that he has to suffer that indignity.

The Torah finds room for empathy for the stranger who stole your sheep validating him and the shame he encounters in the theft. We can find room for empathy for our children when shame, guilt, anxiety, fear, or sadness drive them to poor behavior.



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
