Now when Pharaoh let the people go, Hashem did not lead them by way of the land of the Phillistines, although it was nearer; for Hashem said, "The people may have a change of heart when they see war, and return to Egypt."

One time I was walking along the path, and I saw a young boy sitting at the crossroads. And I said to him: On which path shall we walk in order to get to the city? He said to me: This path is short and long, and that path is long and short. I walked on the path that was short and long. When I approached the city I found that gardens and orchards surrounded it, and I did not know the trails leading through them to the city. I went back and met the young boy again and said to him: My son, didn't you tell me that this way is short? He said to me: And didn't I tell you that it is also long? I kissed him on his head and said to him: Happy are you, O Israel, for you are all exceedingly wise, from your old to your young.

The first step is complete, but it is the easier of the two. In a blinding flash, the *Bnei Yisroel* have been taken out of *Mitzrayim*. It will take another forty years to take *Mitzrayim* out of the *B'nei Yisroel*.

The *possuk* tells us that Hashem could have taken the people directly to the Land of Israel. He chose not to, for the direct route was "too close." The *Meshech Chochma* explains asfollows: The people, having been raised in the beliefs and views of Egyptian society, would quickly adopt the Emorite and Canaanite practices immediately upon entry to the land of Canaan. It would take forty years in the desert for G-d to reeducate the Jewish People to stand a chance of resisting the comfortable familiarity of Pagan belief and practice.

The *Meshech Chochma* is a profound idea in *chinuch* and parenting. There are no shortcuts to success in imbuing those whom you are charged with raising with proper beliefs and ideas. Even G-d, Himself, could not rush the process of educating the nation. Had they gone the short route, it would have ended up being quite the longer route. Instead, Hashem chose the longer route, in the end, shorter and more effective.

It is hard to overemphasize how important a principle this is in parenting. Our job as parents is to raise and educate children to functional adulthood. That is a job without shortcuts. It takes years of patience and time. The temptation to find the shorter route will only lead one down a long and difficult road later on.

The most prominent manifestation of this idea comes in the distinction between *chinuch* and control. The two are not interchangeable, even though we sometimes mistake one for the other.

A classic scenario any parent will recognize: Your child is being uncooperative, even defiant, not listening to direction and refusing to comply with your requests and your orders, or worse, refusing to live up to the standards you have set for your family. You have ability to impose your will on your child by taking advantage of the power imbalance between parent and young child. You do so, loudly, forcefully, and unequivocally. You will likely win the battle, but you are almost guaranteed to lose the war. You have done nothing to further the child's education in this regard, save for educating him that once the balance of power shifts in his favor as he grows up, he will no longer have to follow your rules.

Instead, choose to take the time to allow your child to fail, to allow for him to suffer the natural consequences of his mistakes. Speak softly, clearly, firmly, but gently, repeating your values and your expectations. Impose fair, meaningful, measured consequences that will have your child reflect

on his actions and consider how he can be and do better. You will be frustrated at the seeming lack of results. You will be frustrated watching the neighbors' seemingly perfect children who do not defy their parents, act up, or misbehave.

Those children don't visibly act up because their parents have chosen the shortcut of power and control to keep them in line. That short route too often proves to be long indeed at the far end of the road. You, instead, have chosen the longer route, one that will test your mettle and your patience. You have chosen not to control your children, but to educate them. That route will be long now, but prove far shorter in the long run.

Of course, there are times where we do not have the luxury to patiently educate our children, and we must exercise control. There are planes to catch, deadlines to meet, and regular safety issues that require us to wield power and control over our sometimes recalcitrant children. But, those occasions should be the exception, limited to times when absolutely necessary.

Functional adult is definitely a place worth going, and there really are no shortcuts to getting our children there.
