The more you know, the easier it will be for you to learn new things

-Daniel T Willingham

Daniel T Willingham is a cognitive psychologist specializing in the study of education and learning. Willingham has published numerous articles and books on the subject, including one of my personal favorites, Why Don't Students Like School. Among his keen insights and observations is Dr. Willingham's perspective on prior knowledge as it relates to learning.

Willingham combed the cognitive research and determined that a baseline of prior knowledge is a key element to the accumulation of more knowledge. As Willingham puts it:

> Knowledge does much more than just help students hone their thinking skills: It actually makes learning easier. Knowledge is not only cumulative, it grows exponentially. Those with a rich base of factual knowledge find it easier to learn more—the rich get richer. In addition, factual knowledge enhances cognitive processes like problem solving and reasoning. The richer the knowledge base, the more smoothly and effectively these cognitive processes—the very ones that teachers target—operate. So, the more knowledge students accumulate, the smarter they become.

He offers a three-pronged argument to explain why a base of knowledge can enhance and enrich future learning.

First, having prior knowledge makes it easier to assimilate new knowledge. Learning, either by reading or listening, requires the learner to make correct inferences to fill in the gaps. Information, presented orally or in writing, assumes a certain level of knowledge on the part of the listener or reader. Willingham offers the following example: "Suppose you read this brief text: "John's face fell as he looked down at his protruding belly. The invitation specified 'black tie' and he hadn't worn his tux since his own wedding, 20 years earlier." "Your mind is well able to fill in the gaps because you know that people are often heavier 20 years after their wedding, and that gaining weight usually means that old clothing won't fit. This background knowledge about the world is readily available and so the writer need not specify it." Children lacking a broad base of knowledge will struggle to fill in those gaps and will often be lost.

Prior knowledge also helps you to think about new information. Our working memory is limited, there is only so much information we can hold in our active working memory at any one time. Those whose working memories are occupied trying to comprehend and assimilate all new information will not have the mental space to think about that information. Those with a prior base of knowledge will have to dedicate less of their working memory to assimilating the information and will have the free space to process and think about that information.

Additionally, prior knowledge serves as an aid to memory when incorporating new information and ideas. Information that is totally new has no repository in our mind to which to attach. But, if the new information relates to that which we already know, then we file the added ideas along with the points already embedded in our minds, and they stick. Rabbi Yisroel Gottlieb

# PARENTING in PARSHA



Cognitive psychology's discovery of the relationship between prior knowledge and further learning is yet another example of modern science and academia's stumbling upon concepts that our sages recognized millennia ago. The *gemara* in *Brachos*, based in part on the wording of the *possuk* related to those chosen for the work in the *mishakan*, tells us that Hashem only grants wisdom to one already possessed with wisdom. It seems that the *gemara* was well aware that prior knowledge brings further knowledge.

Dr. Willingham employs the paradigm of prior knowledge to explain a welldocumented but not as well understood phenomenon in education, the fourth grade reading slump. Educators have long observed and studies have confirmed that children from both poor and affluent backgrounds will tend to do about equally well on measures of reading skill in grades one through three. But, a significant gap appears in the fourth grade between students from poorer backgrounds and their more affluent counterparts, a gap that continues to widen through school.

#### What explains it?

Fourth grade is where students transition from learning to read to reading to learn. Fluency and automaticity in the mechanics of reading are no longer enough. Now their reading includes abstract concepts and ideas as well as the vocabulary in which those abstract concepts and ideas live. Children who lack background knowledge and vocabulary will expend their mental energy trying to comprehend and assimilate all this new information, while their classmate have both literally and figuratively turned the page and moved on to more information and deeper thought. As the more knowledgeable students gain even more knowledge than their counterparts, the gap widens and grows.

Children from poorer backgrounds tend to have less exposure to culture, abstract idea, and to have poorer vocabularies than peers from more affluent homes. They can keep up just fine when learning to read, but begin to lag when reading to learn.

The implication for parents is clear. Life is full of teachable moments. Make sure your kids are with you to experience those moments and take advantage of them to teach your children. Expand your vocabulary and that of your children. Fill them up with knowledge and you will make room in their minds for more knowledge as they move forward in their education.






