ויקהל Team-Building

In the actual building of the *mishkan*, a holy abode to which all the hearts of Bnei Yisroel turn, through that itself Moshe gathered the whole congregation. He Combined them and unified them into one whole.

As the dust cleared from the disaster of the *chet ha'egel*, the *Bnei Yisroel* desperately needed to rectify their grievous error. Building the *mishkan* was an essential part of the process, but it would not be enough on its own.

Reb Yaakov Kamenetsky, in a beautiful observation on the opening phrase of the *parsha*, explains how the *chet ha'egel* sowed division and discord among the *bnei Yisroel*. He cites the *Yerushalmi* in Sanhedrin stating that the *Bnei Yisroel* actually made twelve golden calves, desiring multiple gods. Why twelve? Just as each separate nation had a god of its own, the individual *shevatim* at the time saw themselves as separate nations, each with a god of its own. The unity achieved at *matan Torah* had evaporated.

Moshe, therefore needed to reunite the people, to bring them back together as a whole. That is why the *parsha* begins with *vayakhel Moshe*, "and Moshe gathered together the whole congregation of Israel." The part that Reb Yaakov does not address directly is precisely how Moshe gathered them together. Certainly, calling them together for a speech would not heal the cracks and fissure in the nation left form the *chet ha'egel*.

For that, we turn to a fabulous comment by Rav Avrohom Borenstein, the *Avnei Nezer*. The building of the *mishkan* was not the result of unity among the people, it was the cause of it. Moshe did not gather the people together to build the *mishkan*, he had them build the *mishkan* in order to bring them together. Moshe, at the direction of the *ribono shel olam*, understood that the best way to bring people together is to have them work together on a shared project and goal.

Social scientists, corporate human resource advisors, and schoolteachers have all come to recognize the team-building value of putting disparate people shoulder-to-shoulder to work together toward a common end. Ethnic and communal tensions often melt away as participants must work together to achieve their shared vision and purpose. Pulling all of the *shevatim* together to build their common *mishkan* was the single-greatest way to "gather the people."

What is true for societies, companies, and schoolchildren is equally true for families as well. It takes genuine, deliberate effort to bring and keep families together. As many parents can readily attest, the mere fact of living under the same roof does not mean that members of a household will be unified, or even be civil toward one another.

Parents who want a calm, healthy atmosphere of family unity cannot simply wait around and hope that it will happen on its own. Instead, they should follow the lead of Moshe in the *midbar*. Bringing a family together to have each member roll up his or her sleeves, work hard, and stand shoulder-to-shoulder with the rest of the family will help build teamwork and foster family unity.

Giving speeches will not be enough; waiting around, hoping for the best will not suffice either. Finding meaningful projects that families can work on together, involving each member of the family in the process, that's what will build unity and forge your family into a single, cohesive unit.


