

YOR Mesivta Dress Code

- Cleanliness, neatness, and good grooming contribute to a positive self-image and to an appropriate atmosphere for *tefillah* and *limud haTorah*, as well as any academic endeavor.
- All Talmidim must come to Yeshiva wearing an all-white button down dress shirt, and dark dress slacks. Sports pants, pants with elastic cuffs, cargo pants, tight fitting or narrow legged pants, pants with zippers on the sides or legs, buttons, snaps, studs, logos, flaps over the pockets, or five pocket pants, are not acceptable. *Talmidim* are to be fully dressed at all times. Shirts must be buttoned up to (not including) the collar button.
- Hats and dark dress jackets are required for all *tefillos*. Additionally, out of respect for davening, shirts must be fully tucked in during all tefillos.
- Black dress shoes or all black sneakers with a shoe-like appearance must be worn throughout the day. Boots of any type may not be worn to Yeshiva except when there is snow on the ground. All visible areas of the shoes should be black, including the sides of the soles and the laces. Ankle socks will NOT be allowed. Clogs or other footwear without backs are not permitted. (Sneakers may only be worn in the gym or during a sports activity.)
- In cold weather, acceptable sweaters or sweatshirts may be worn over a regular white shirt. Garments with hoods, writing, pictures, logos, or bright, shocking colors, are not permitted in Yeshiva. Haircuts should reflect the appearance of a ben Torah. The sides and top should be of similar length (sides never less than a #3). If a talmid comes to Yeshiva with a haircut that is not acceptable, he will need to return home to fix it (which may require waiting until it grows back appropriately, even for a first offense.) The Hanhala reserves the right to determine whether a particular garment or haircut will be considered appropriate.
- The first time a *talmid* comes to school improperly dressed, he will be advised to procure appropriate attire. If his attempt is unsuccessful, administrative discretion will determine if he will be allowed to enter class. A note informing the parents of the violation will be sent home. A *talmid* that violates the dress code a second time will not be allowed to attend class until he arranges for proper attire. Consistent violation of the Yeshiva dress code, will be considered grounds for suspension.
- Please note: The Yeshiva is going to enforce the dress code strictly. Please be careful when shopping, to be in compliance with the above rules. The claim of "I already bought it and cannot be expected to purchase a new one" will not be accepted by the Yeshiva, and may leave your son out of class until he is in compliance.

Additionally, talmidim of Yeshivas Ohr Reuven represent bnei Torah in general, and our Yeshiva in particular, wherever they happen to be. It is therefore incumbent on each of our talmidim to wear a hat and jacket to any tefillah they may attend throughout the year, both on weekdays and on Shabbos. They should also be dressed like bnei Torah (in full compliance with the Yeshiva dress code) anytime they appear in public.
