You miss 100% of the shots you don't take

After decades of marriage failing to conceive a child Sarah overhears her husband being informed by a band of Arab nomads that one year later she, at 90 years of age, and Avrohom, at 100, would bear a child. In response, Sarah laughs at the ridiculousness of the notion. Her laughter seems a normal and reasonable response. Yet, she is called to task for it. And she, herself, realizes that her laughter was inappropriate, as she denies having laughed when confronted. What gives?

Here, the Torah is sharing with us a vital principle for all of life. Many times, we will be confronted with the seemingly impossible and insurmountable. No matter how small the odds though, possibility still exists. Where there is life, there is hope. Except, when we give up. When we no longer try, we change the odds from long ones to impossible. If we don't take the shot, we are guaranteed not to make it. Take it, there's always a chance.

After the horrors of the Holocaust, the Klausenberger Rebbe, the great Rav Yekusiel Yehuda Halberstam, became the father to all the orphaned children and the light of hope for the devastated survivors in the DP camps. The first Yom Kippur after the war, in the Feldafing DP camp, the Rebbe conducted Yom Kippur tefilos for the survivors. When he reached the vidui portion of the davening, the rebbe turned his eyes heavenward and called out, "Who wrote the machzor? None of this applies to us. Who was guilty in the concentration camps? Who had the time or strength for sin? Who stole in the camps? What was there to steal? Who sinned in eating forbidden foods? What was there to eat? No, said the rebbe, we are not guilty of any of these things. If so, what is our sin? To what failing must we confess on this Yom kippur? Our sin", said the Klausenberger Rebbe, "was the sin of losing hope, of giving up".

Giving up hope is antithetical to our belief system. The Kotzker Rebbe used to say, ye'ush is she'lo mi'da'as. Giving up comes from ignorance.

Children often feel overwhelmed by tasks and demands that seem to be beyond them. It is our job as parents to make sure that the demands that we make of our children are attainable. If we demand things from our children that they truly cannot do, or allow others to make those demands, we condition our children to give up hope. Instead, we need to challenge our children with demands that are just beyond their reach and then help them to extend that reach. We must create experiences for our children to rise to challenges and conquer new expectations so that they will have a reservoir of experience to draw from whenever the going gets tough.
